

# Class of 2022/2023 Graduate Exit Survey Results

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## 1. Methodology

The online, structured survey was sent via email and SMS at varying times to graduating students over the three weeks that fall before, during and after the December 2022, March 2023 and July 2023 graduations. Research ethics clearance was acquired from the CHED Research Ethics Committee and the Department of Student Affairs. The list of graduation qualifiers was provided by a contact in the Deputy Registrar's office in the run up to graduation. 286 Qualifiers with fee blocks (based on a list acquired from the Fees Office), were removed from the survey contact list to avoid causing further distress to those who could not attend graduation due to outstanding debt.

# 2. Data Cleaning

Response data was cleaned by removing duplicates and apparent incorrect student numbers. In cases where student numbers were incorrect, but possible to infer (i.e incorrect spacing or the numerical campus IDs), the number was adjusted after comparing it to the graduate's details in PeopleSoft. In cases where the intended number was not possible to infer, the data was removed. Where respondents submitted duplicates the second response was included.

The data was then manually converted into the ICTS required ETL (Extract, Transform, Load) format to be moved into the UCT student data warehouse. There it was matched with student demographic and course data captured in PeopleSoft. During this process a further 34 submitted student numbers were not found in PeopleSoft and related data was also removed.

The data should then be uploaded to the Careers Service Exit Survey Data Dashboard, which automatically visualises the data, but due to resource constraints, the current dashboard is inaccessible and a new dashboard is not yet in place. This meant the data set had to go through an extremely time-consuming process to be manually matched to Peoplesoft data where possible.

## 3. Participation Rate

The Class of 2022 consisted of **7184** December 2022, March 2023 and July 2023 graduates. Overall 40% of qualifiers who received the survey responded, but once duplicates and unusable entries were removed and qualifiers with fee blocks were added back into the full population the response rate came to **37%**.

Total Class of 2022 Graduate Population: 7164 Respondents providing usable data: 2635 The response rate per faculty varied between 30% to 40%. Graduates in the Law and Health Science faculties were the hardest to engage.

# 4. Demographic Summary

Based on a comparison of the demographic details of the full graduation population and the pool of respondents, the Survey sample is deemed quite representative of the full population (see figures 3 to 6). There is no more than a 2% variance between the faculty, population, gender, and citizenship representation between the list of qualifiers and Survey respondents.

# 5. Results

#### 5.1 **Primary activity at time of graduation**

Results (figure 7) show that the UCT graduate employment rate is creeping back to pre-pandemic levels and employment seekers declined slightly from the previous graduating cohort.

Graduates 'Seeking Studies' or taking a 'Gap Year' decreased significantly over the past four years whilst the number of entrepreneurs graduating seems to remain stable, however as students can make up to three selections for this question, a number of respondents who fall in the self-employed category tend to select both employed and self-employed as options.

#### Primary activity per faculty

When the employment results are compared per faculty (figure 7) a correlation between employment and further studies is clear. Lower employment rate leads to higher percentage of graduates studying further. This is particularly evident for the Humanities and Science Faculties.

#### **Meaningfully Occupied**

When the 'Employed', 'Studying' and 'Self-employed' categories are combined, a total of 79.2% of the UCT Class of 2022 was found to be meaningfully occupied at the time of graduation. Figure 9 illustrates this rate according to the various faculties.

#### **Relation to degree**

More than two thirds of respondents report (figure 10) that their job is directly related to their degree.

#### **Employment Sector**




Figure 11. Employment sector

Most 2022 graduates who went on to work, find themselves in the private sector (figure 11). This category is however one where respondents tend to incorrectly self-report, despite prompts in the survey. For example, even respondents holding senior positions at UCT report that they work in government or NGO sectors.

# Salary

Almost a quarter of employed respondents earn in the R20 000 to R30 000 bracket (figure 12) a further 19% earn more than R50 000 per month. Median salary for the 2022/2023 graduates:

#### **Employment Location**




Figure 13. Employment Location

The vast majority of graduates remain in South Africa for employment. With smaller numbers securing employment in another African country or overseas (figure 13). Among the African countries, most mentioned are Namibia (17 respondents), Kenya (7), and Botswana and Zimbabwe (5 respondents each). Most frequent overseas options include the United Kingdom (19 respondents), United States (8) and the Netherlands (5).




Figure 14. Province located in South Africa

Of those employed graduates remaining in South Africa. Most find themselves based in the Western Cape (figure 14).

## 5.3 Further Study Related Questions

Of the respondents who indicated that they were studying further at the time of graduation or plan to study further, the vast majority (73%) indicated that UCT will remain their institution of choice (figure 15).

## Other




Figure 16. WordCloud representation of respondents selection under 'Other' for Studying further

Looking further into the options respondents offered under the 'Other' option for their preferred institution for further studies, most expressed their interest in studying abroad. As per the Word Cloud (figure 16) used to illustrate the frequency of choices submitted under 'Other', respondents selecting this category were either unsure or opting for studies abroad. Institutions mentioned were mainly based in Europe. Local institutions mentioned that were not covered under the options given include a number of South African private colleges and universities.




Figure 18. Source of funding for further studies
