

Class of 2023 Graduate Exit Survey Results

1. Methodology

An online, structured survey was used to collect the Class of 2023's employability. The survey was distributed via email and SMS at varying times to graduating students over four weeks which fell before, during and after each of the July 2023, December 2023, and March 2024 graduation periods. The required research ethics clearance was secured from the Centre for Higher Education Development Research Ethics Committee (CHED REC) and the Department of Student Affairs. Qualifier lists were provided by the Deputy Registrar's office before graduations. Qualifiers with fee blocks were excluded from the survey contact list to avoid causing distress to those who were not able to graduate due to fee debt.

2. Data Cleaning

Survey responses were cleaned through the removal of duplicates and apparent incorrect student numbers. In cases where student numbers were incorrect, but possible to infer (i.e due to incorrect spacing or where numerical campus IDs were used), the number was adjusted after comparing it to the graduate's details in PeopleSoft. In cases where the intended number was not possible to infer, the data was removed. In case of duplicate submissions, the second response was included.

3. Participation Rate

The Class of 2023 consisted of 6810 July 2023, December 2023 and March 2024 graduates. 394 qualifiers had fee debt and were excluded. 40% of qualifiers who received the survey responded. The response rate per faculty ranged from 33% to 47%. Graduates in the Law and Health Science faculties remain the hardest to engage.

4. Degree level of respondents




Figure 3. Degree level / Career of Respondents

Undergraduate students accounted for 52.2% respondents and postgraduates were 43.7% (figure 3).

5. Results

5.1 Primary activity at time of graduation

Survey results relating to the UCT 2023 graduates' primary activity at time of graduation (figure 4) show that the employment rate for this cohort at 48.3% is even higher than before the pandemic. At the same time, graduates seeking employment increased significantly from before the pandemic. 16.6% of the 2023 graduates were still looking for work at time of graduation. Graduates continuing their studies decreased slightly from 30.8% in 2022 to 28.1%.

5.1.1 Primary activity per faculty

Graduates from the Commerce, Engineering and the Built Environment, Health Science and Law faculties have a much higher employment rate than the average rate across faculties (figure 5). Humanities and Science graduates have the lowest employment rate at 31.6% and 32.2% respectively. Graduates from the Humanities and Science faculties are slightly more entrepreneurial than their peers.

5.1.2 Meaningfully Occupied


When combining the 'Employed', 'Studying' and 'Self-employed' categories, a total of **80%** of the UCT Class of 2023 are categorised as meaningfully occupied at the time of graduation. Figure 6 illustrates this rate according to the various faculties.




Figure 7. 'Meaningfully Occupied' per Faculty

More than 80% of employed graduates from 2023 claim that they are satisfied with the job they were in at the time of graduation (figure 7).

Two thirds of respondents report (figure 8) that their job is directly related to their degree.

5.3.2 Employment Sector




Figure 9. Employment sector

Most 2023 graduates who were working at time of graduation, find themselves in the private sector (figure 9). Graduates working in the public sector (including public universities and public health) tally 18% and a further 16% of the 2023 graduates find themselves in the Government sector (including national, provincial and parastatals organisations).

5.3.3 Salary

A fifth of employed respondents report that they earn between R20 000 and R30 000 (figure 10) per month. A further 18% earn more than R50 000 per month. The percentage of graduates falling in the R20 000 to R30 000 salary bracket decreased from 24% for the previous graduating class to just over 20% for the Class of 2023. Graduates earning less than R5000 or less at time of graduation almost doubled from the previous graduating class. Median salary for the 2023 graduates: R25 000

5.3.4 Employment Location




Figure 11. Employment Location

90% of the 2023 graduates are employed in South Africa. Six percent graduates work in another African country and four percent are based overseas (figure 11). Those working outside of South African borders find themselves in 15 different African countries (figure 12) and in 19 different countries overseas (figure 13).




Figure 14. Province located in South Africa

Of those employed graduates remaining in South Africa, almost two thirds are based in the Western Cape (figure 14).

5.4.2 Reason for further studies


Investing in future career progression, was the main reason half of graduates provided for furthering their studies (figure 16). Other main reasons include bettering employment chances and planning and academic career.
